Charter prioritizes partnerships and activities that give us the ability to identify, engage and track spend with women-owned, minority-owned, disabled veteran-owned, LGBT-owned and disabled person owned business enterprises (diverse-owned) for the purposes of progressing our supplier diversity program in California and nationally.

Internal Activities

- Partnered with our California Field Operations organization to update the opportunity pipeline for diverse suppliers identifying potential areas of need within California
- Continued Tier 1 and Tier 2 diverse spend reporting and activated additional reporting for Prime suppliers. Enhanced California specific Tier 2 diverse spend reporting by automating the reporting process and increasing communication with Prime suppliers
- Enhanced our internal supplier management systems to support improved ability to identify, track, and report on existing diverse suppliers within the supply base
- Provided quarterly diverse spend reporting to the executive of each internal Charter business unit and major operating function
- Provided diverse spend reporting for the annual corporate board of directors meeting
- Held 2 External Diversity and Inclusion Council (EDIC) meetings to assist and advise Charter in the
 development, monitoring and evaluation of all diversity efforts including supplier diversity. Our
 EDIC is made up of national civic and business leaders and helps us to implement our D&I strategy
 in an impactful way
- Created a direct pathway for EDIC members to recommend qualified diverse suppliers to be considered for Charter opportunities
- Communicated with Charter leaders at the VP and above levels about our D&I Strategy, inclusive of the Supplier Diversity program, which included information on how best to recommend diverse suppliers. We continue to maintain information on Supplier Diversity on Charter's D&I intranet pages, including how employees may refer diverse suppliers

Charter's diverse spend with CPUC certified suppliers supporting California operations was 14.51% for fiscal year 2023, a decrease from 15.31% in 2022. This reduction results from an increase in California net procurement spend of 5%, and an approximate 1% decrease in California diverse spend compared to 2022.

Charter's Supplier Diversity Program operates with a focus on utilizing minority, woman, disabled, LGBTQ, veteran, and disabled-veteran owned businesses for product and service needs across our 41-state footprint. Though we maintain separate reporting that aligns with the guidelines for diverse business ownership set forth in California's General Order 156 (GO 156), we continue to leverage a singular national strategy and plan for the full scope of the Supplier Diversity program. Charter works to identify and engage qualified suppliers for available contract opportunities at both Tier 1 and Tier 2 levels; assists eligible suppliers in obtaining diverse certifications; and supports supplier educational development through various partner organizations around the country.

Procurement spend that qualifies for inclusion in the GO 156 report is primarily managed within our Field Operations business unit. In 2023, this business unit began new projects associated to Charter's network expansion and evolution initiatives in various regions across the country including California. These projects contributed to a change in the mix of opportunities for suppliers in these locations and resulted in a change in suppliers utilized in 2023. As Charter continues to progress in our network initiatives, we will continue to align Supplier Diversity with business unit stakeholders and decision makers to match qualified diverse suppliers to active and upcoming needs and opportunities across our footprint.

Charter continues to leverage our supply base for needs across the company and footprint. Of the 42 California certified diverse suppliers utilized in 2023, more than 90% were retained from the 2022 report and have been working with Charter for multiple years. Charter has spend with all 42 California certified suppliers outside of the California reporting parameters in support of our program nationally garnering \$633 million in total spend in 2023, approximately 504% more than the spend reported in accordance with GO 156 guidelines.

Finance

The Charter Corporate Finance & Financial Services teams are committed to working and maintaining relationships with diverse-owned investment banking firms and asset managers. - In 2023, Charter partnered with 8 different WMDVBE investment banking firms for the execution of our bond financing activity: Loop Capital (minority-owned), Siebert Williams Shank (minority-owned), Cabrera Capital (minority-owned), Penserra (minority-owned), R. Seelaus & Co. (woman-owned), Tigress Financial Partners (woman-owned), Academy Securities (service-disabled veteran-owned), and Mischler Financial Group (service-disabled veteran-owned)
- Charter spent \$897k in bond underwriting fees with these WMDVBE investment banking firms in 2023
- For each of its bond financings, Charter selects a small number of WMDVBE banks to participate.
 Charter intends to continue this going forward and to seek out additional ways to work with such banks

- The Spectrum Community Investment Loan Fund, which invests in community development financial institutions to fund small businesses (including diverse-owned businesses) in underserved communities within Charter's service area, has committed to 100% diverse-owned investment bank engagement for underwriting, due diligence, and servicing engagements
- Throughout 2023, the Loan Fund has worked with 3 separate minority-owned investment banks to provide these services: Cabrera Capital, Castle Oak Securities, and Siebert Williams Shank
- Drexel Hamilton (service-disabled veterans owned) and Cavu (service-disabled veterans owned) managed an average balance of approximately \$6m of cash invested in various funds throughout 2023
- Charter maintained deposits of \$5 million to Minority Depository Institutions as part of our program to support MDI banks
