

What are Ex Parte Communications?

Proceedings at the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) follow specific legal procedures to ensure fairness, and to ensure that all parties in a proceeding have access to the same information and can respond to the communication. These include rules for ex parte communications.

Ex parte communication is:

- Oral or written communications between an interested person and decision-makers about substantive matters in proceedings.
- A decision-maker can be the CPUC's Commissioners and their Advisors, Chief Administrative Law Judge, Assistant Chief Administrative Law Judges, and the Administrative Law Judge(s) assigned to the proceeding.
- An interested person includes parties, agents or employees of parties, participants in hearings, persons with financial interests in a proceeding, or any representative of any organization who intends to influence the decision of a Commissioner on a matter before the CPUC.



Different types of ex parte communications may include, but are not limited to:

- Scheduled in-person meetings, including telephone calls, and spontaneous conversations.
- Written communications, including emails.

Each Type of Proceeding Has Different Rules for Ex Parte Communications

- ADJUDICATORY PROCEEDINGS prohibit ex parte communications.
- QUASI-LEGISLATIVE PROCEEDINGS permit ex parte communications.
- RATE-SETTING PROCEEDINGS RATES allow ex parte communications if they
 follow the CPUC's Rules of Practice and Procedure (www.cpuc.ca.gov/RPP).

Reporting Ex Parte Communications

For ex parte communications that must be reported, a notice of ex parte communication must be filed within three business days of the communication. The notice must describe when and where an ex parte communication occurred, who the decision-maker was, and any other attendees. The notice must also describe the interested person's communication and include copies of any documents provided.
