PUBLIC PARTICIPATION HEARING

San Gabriel Valley Water Company – General Rate Case Application (A.22-01-003)

The following information is taken directly from San Gabriel Valley Water Company's application, **Fontana Water Company Division**, to the CPUC.

What is this Rate Application About?

Every three years, the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) requires San Gabriel Valley Water Company (San Gabriel) to file a General Rate Case (GRC) application. This application allows the CPUC to take a broad, indepth look at San Gabriel's income and expenses and consider quality of service and other factors, and then decide whether to raise or lower San Gabriel's rates, and whether to require other changes in San Gabriel's operations. A proposed decision in San Gabriel's GRC is expected in May of 2023 for rates to take effect on July 1, 2023.

In this application, San Gabriel is requesting that the CPUC approve a rate increase.

What Increases in Revenue is San Gabriel Requesting to be Funded Through Customer Water Bills for the Period of 2023-2026?¹

For 2023-2024: \$9.20 million (11.3%) above present revenues

For 2024-2025: \$5.16 million (5.7%) above proposed 2023-2024 revenues

For 2025-2026: \$5.28 million (5.4%) above proposed 2024-2025 revenues

What Types of Additional Costs Does San Gabriel Say it Needs to Recover?

San Gabriel is requesting to recover costs for proposed new capital investments to replace and upgrade its water system and facilities as well as for additional administrative, general, and labor costs. San Gabriel's application requests:

Proposed new capital investments:

• Infrastructure Replacement: \$1.41 million 3-year capital expenditure budget increase for capital investments in facility retirements, improvements, and replacements; replacement wells; and improved water treatment systems

Increases for costs of operation over the three-year GRC period:

- Employee Labor Costs: \$3.28 million increase in expected payroll, pensions, and benefits costs
- Outside Services: \$0.80 million increase including costs of accounting, water treatment and operation, and other contracted services.

¹ The amount of revenue to be authorized is based on the forecasted operating and capital costs of doing business. This, combined with forecasted water sales and number of customers, produces the necessary changes in rates.

- Water Treatment Expenses: \$3.28 million increase reflecting expected increases in costs of chemicals, treatment plant labor, and other water treatment-related items.
- Taxes and Fees: \$0.66 million increase including state and federal income taxes, sales and property
- taxes, and payroll taxes.
- **Insurance:** \$0.45 million increase reflecting expected increases in insurance premiums

Decreased sales forecasts:

• Sales Forecast: \$7.8 million increase. San Gabriel predicts declining revenues from declining quantities of water supplied, in part due to the conservation efforts associated with ongoing drought conditions. As a result, San Gabriel requests an

increase in rates to achieve the revenue necessary to provide safe and reliable water service.

What are the Residential Bill Impacts Based on Requested Revenue Increases?


Excluding CPUC fee, City Tax, surcharges and refunds, an average residential customer with a 5/8-inch meter using 14 CCF (1 CCF = 748 gallons) every month will see an increase in their monthly bill from \$78.57 in July of 2022 to \$83.21 in July of 2023, a 5.9% increase. The same bill is estimated to be \$92.51 in July of 2024 and \$97.35 in July of 2025, resulting in an overall 23.90% rate increase over 3 years.

The graph below shows the distribution of monthly metered water usage per bill amongst residential customers for calendar year 2021. It illustrates that approximately 53% of monthly bills during this period were less than or equal to the average water usage of **14 CCF**.



What Other Requests are Pending for San Gabriel?

Besides this GRC, there is one other pending application (A.20-10-004) for San Gabriel regarding the acquisition of the City of Montebello municipal water system. As San Gabriel has proposed it, the Montebello acquisition will not result in an additional rate increase for Fontana Water Company customers.
