SDG&E Report on De-Energization Events: September 28–29, 2020

This report covers the initiation of Public Safety Power Shutoff (PSPS) protocols that occurred in SDG&E's service territory from September 28 through September 29, 2020. As discussed below, while SDG&E initiated its PSPS protocols, including customer notifications, SDG&E did not actually de-energize customers for public safety in this time period. SDG&E submits this report to the Director of Safety and Enforcement Division (SED) and the service lists for Rulemaking (R.) 18-12-005 and R.18-10-007. This report includes the information required by Decision (D.) 12-04-024, Section II.A of CPUC Resolution ESRB-8, D.19-05-042, and D.20-05-051.

The analysis and data provided in this report are based on the most current information available at the time and are subject to modification resulting from additional analyses and assessments completed following submission of the report.

- 1. An explanation of SDG&E's decision to de-energize, including an explanation of alternatives considered; mitigation measures used to decrease the risk of utility-caused wildfires in de-energized areas; a thorough and detailed description of the quantitative and qualitative factors SDG&E considered in calling, sustaining or curtailing the PSPS event, including information regarding why PSPS was a last resort option; and the specific conditions SDG&E determined must be present for the de-energization event to be concluded.**

Response:

Explanation of Decision to Initiate PSPS Protocols

The decision to initiate Public Safety Power Shutoffs (PSPS) protocols was made at SDG&E's Emergency Operations Center (EOC), which was fully staffed in a remote environment by a cross-functional team of electric operations, safety, meteorology, engineering, customer service, external affairs, communications, and other personnel, as well as a designated Utility Incident Commander (UIC) for the event. SDG&E activated its EOC to provide coordinated response; ensure there was informed decision-making; coordinate as-needed logistic support; and manage notifications to all affected stakeholders, including customers, state agencies, local jurisdictions, tribal governments, elected representatives, and public safety partners.

Weather Forecasts and Conditions

SDG&E's EOC was activated on Monday, September 28 at 04:00 in response to weather forecasts for potential for Santa Ana winds with isolated gusts over 40 mph, as well as abnormally hot temperatures and very dry conditions. Official National Weather Service (NWS) forecasts were similar, with the potential for wind gusts of 40 mph, and localized stronger gusts in the windiest locations. A Red Flag Warning was issued for Monday, September 28th for 05:00 through 17:00. On Monday evening, NWS extended the Red Flag Warning through Tuesday at 17:00. In addition, a Heat Advisory was issued for Tuesday, September 29 through Thursday, October 1 for San Diego County inland valleys. Based on advance weather forecasts, SDG&E determined PSPS could be necessary.

Local Fire Conditions and Fire Potential

SDG&E’s Fire Potential Index (FPI) was rated as “Extreme” for several inland areas and “Elevated” for all other portions of SDG&E’s service area on September 28, with all districts remaining “Elevated” on September 29.¹ Additionally, the Santa Ana Wildfire Threat Index (SAWTI) was rated “Marginal” for September 28–29, indicating that upon ignition, fires may grow rapidly.

The SAWTI calculates the potential for large wildfire activity based on the strength, extent, and duration of the wind, dryness of the air, dryness of the vegetation, and greenness of the grasses. Similar to the hurricane-rating system (category 1-5), the SAWTI compares current environmental data to climatological data and correlates it with historical wildfires to rate the Santa Ana wind event on a scale from “marginal” to “extreme.” To help the region prepare for hazardous conditions, information from the SAWTI is issued daily to fire agencies and other first-responders, which has led to specific preparedness and operational decisions based on the likelihood of a catastrophic wildfire fueled by Santa Ana winds. The public also has access to SAWTI to make personal safety decisions.²

SDG&E’s Fire Coordination team monitored regional fire activity and staffing levels at local, state, and federal fire agencies. SDG&E uses these details to inform the larger situational awareness picture and when making the decision to implement de-energizations for public safety. Fire Coordination also supported the mitigation measures used to decrease the risk of utility caused wildfires by reinforcing the standards listed in SDG&E Electric Standard Practice 113.1—Operations and Maintenance Wildland Fire Prevention Plan and increasing use of prevention resources.

Alternatives Considered

After monitoring and considering weather conditions, de-energizations for public safety were not implemented during this event.

Mitigation Measures to Decrease Utility-Caused Fire Risk in De-Energized Areas

Not applicable as no areas were de-energized during this event.

Conditions to Conclude the PSPS Event

Based on favorable weather conditions and expiration of the Red Flag Warning, SDG&E’s UIC approved conclusion of the PSPS event and demobilization of SDG&E’s EOC.

2. All factors considered by SDG&E in its decision to de-energize, including wind speed, temperature, humidity and vegetation moisture in the vicinity of the de-energized circuits.

Response:

The decision to de-energize for public safety is not based on a single factor; numerous criteria are considered when making this decision.

Key bases for these decisions included, but were not limited to:

- Weather forecast indicated the potential for Santa Ana winds with isolated gusts over 40 mph, along with abnormally hot temperatures and very dry conditions;
- The FPI was rated Extreme for several inland areas and Elevated for all other areas of SDG&E's service territory on September 28;
- The FPI was rated Elevated for all of SDG&E's service area on Sept. 29;
- The SAWTI was rated Marginal for the 28th and 29th, indicating that upon ignition, fires may grow rapidly;
- Official NWS forecasts mentioned the potential for wind gusts of 40 mph, with stronger localized gusts in the most wind-prone locations;
- A Red Flag Warning was issued for Monday, September 28 at 05:00 through Tuesday, September 29 at 17:00;
- A Heat Advisory was issued for September 29 through October 1 for San Diego County inland valleys.

Response:

Not applicable; no customers were impacted by de-energizations during this event.

SDG&E did not utilize sectionalization to mitigate customer impacts during this event, as no de-energizations for public safety were initiated.

SDG&E used sectionalizing devices to send warning messages and notifications of potential PSPS impacts to specific, more precise customer groups.

Response:

SDG&E proactively notified customers in areas that would potentially be impacted by PSPS. Notifications were made via outbound dialer, email and personal phone calls. Helpful information was also shared on SDG&E's websites (SDGEnews.com and SDGE.com), SDG&E's social media channels (Twitter, Facebook, Instagram) and with local, state and national news media outlets.

All customer notifications were made by SDG&E. During this event, SDG&E successfully made affirmative notifications to medical baseline (MBL) customers who were not reached by phone. SDG&E completed one in-person notification during this event.

SDG&E did not open Community Resource Centers (CRCs) during this event, as no customers were de-energized.

SDG&E provided advanced notification to all appropriate Public Safety Partners and Community Partners. Response:

Not applicable; PSPS were not implemented during this event.

15. Lessons learned by SDG&E from the PSPS event.

Response:

Due to the limited scope of this PSPS event, which did not result in any de-energizations, the lessons learned were also limited. The most important lesson is listed below:

- Due to requirement to provide initial notifications 72-hours prior to the PSPS event, the scope of potential customer impacts can be too high. SDG&E is considering how to communicate this issue to public safety partners, so that planning efforts are more realistic, and resources are not expended unnecessarily. During this event, at the 72-hours prior mark, approximately 16,000 customers were expected to potentially be impacted by PSPS; at 24-hours prior, with more concrete weather forecasts and modeling available, the estimated customer impacts were 19.

16. Recommended updates/modifications the PSPS guidelines adopted in ESRB-8 and D.19-05-042

Response:

During this PSPS event, adverse weather conditions were relatively confined to typical wind prone areas in SDG&E's service territory. The customers in these areas are those who most frequently experience these conditions.

SDG&E proposes that a CRC activation be based upon a minimum duration of outage being met prior to CRCs being activated. It is unreasonable to stage resources, schedule on-call shifts, and require numerous employees and community partners to report to a location simply because it is anticipated to reach certain conditions around a certain time. To activate a CRC immediately following the initiation of a PSPS event, regardless of the duration of the event, is not in the best interests of stakeholders.

During this PSPS event, SDG&E planned to activate the Descanso CRC due to the strict requirement to have a CRC open any time there is an active de-energization event, which resulted in unnecessary resources being expended. SDG&E mobilized dedicated staff and resources to support the Descanso CRC, in anticipation of a PSPS event on September 28–29. If PSPS had been implemented during this event, customer impacts would have been limited to 16 accounts, all of which are located in the areas where these wind conditions are considered to be “typical.”

To remedy this and minimize unnecessary expenses, SDG&E recommends that CRCs be activated within 12 hours of implementation of PSPS where the duration is forecasted to exceed 24 hours. There are other situations and emergencies in which power can be interrupted and it is reasonable to expect that residents can care for themselves for the first 12 hours without power.

SDG&E recommends a threshold, as it allows more advance planning and will allow for consistent messaging with customers. Thresholds would also establish clear expectations for CRC availability. SDG&E respectfully asks the Commission to consider revising this requirement to provide clear, cost-effective CRC activation criteria. SDG&E recommends the following: “CRCs will activate within 12 hours of an active de-energization for a PSPS event where the sustained outage is forecast to exceed 24 hours.”


