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CPUC Talks Disaster Reliability with Telcom Providers

California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) President Marybel Batjer twice in November - once in a letter and again at a pre-hearing conference in San Francisco made it clear to the state's leading telecommunications providers that they needed to do a much better job keeping their systems functioning before, during, and after wildfires and other emergencies.

Other CPUC Commissioners expressed similar comments at the Nov. 20 pre-hearing conference, which was part of Phase 2 of the CPUC's earlier rulemaking regarding an emergency disaster relief program to support California residents.

In that rulemaking, the CPUC approved an emergency disaster relief program to ensure that landline and wireless customers who experience a housing or financial crisis due to a disaster keep vital telecommunications services without being penalized and receive other support.

Communications service providers are now required to implement those disaster relief protections for customers in areas where a State of Emergency is called by the Governor or President. This means that in future disasters, consumers will automatically be protected against being charged various fees associated with terminated and restored service

and will received other help until the emergency is concluded.

Phase 2 of the proceeding is focused on making sure the state's communications grid is resilient, something it has not been during big, fast-moving wildfires and Public Safety Power Shut-offs. As Batjer noted in her Nov. 13 letter, telecommunications providers have

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argued against mandatory requirements being imposed by the CPUC. "Some of you

Batjer called on the companies to "join with the CPUC and step up to address these issues before we experience another devastating wildfire or the unfortunate need for widespread Public Safety Power Shut-offs in California."

Her comments were largely echoed by Mike Wilson, Assistant Chief of CAL FIRE, during his appearance at the pre-hearing conference.

"It is vital that we as a state ensure our communications networks continue to operate during a disaster and that our families, neighbors, and communities have a reliable way to contact and be contacted by public safety officials," Wilson said. "To this end, our partners in the communications industry must be prepared to maintain service before, during and after an emergency. This is particularly important for communities may have only one means of communication such as VoIP."

Resilience of the state's highly competitive telecommunications network has become a growing concern in recent years as wildfires and more frequent use of pre-emptive power shut-offs in risky weather have been accompanied by widespread communications failures.

"Eighty percent of 911 calls are made over wireless networks," Commissioner Clifford Rechtschaffen said at the start of the pre-hearing conference.

"Efforts to activate emergency text alerts or evacuation notices are dependent on communications functioning," Rechtschaffen continued." We heard from city managers and emergency personnel how much they rely on cell coverage to evacuate residents. And of course, customers face a double if not triple whammy when their power goes off. They lose telephone service. They lose TV or radio service and so forth."

During the power shut-offs in October, for instance, 57 percent of Marin County's 280 cellular towers were out of service. At one point on Oct. 28, in San Mateo and Contra Costa Counties in the San Francisco Bay Area, 11 percent of their cell towers failed.

During the pre-hearing conference, President Batjer posed the challenge to telecommunications executives this way: "The thought is coming to my mind of what kind of requirement do we need to make

on this very, very important service that you all provide to the people of California? And, how do we make sure as a regulatory body, as well as officials of the state of California, that information is coming to us in a timely, appropriate manner that can indeed be acted upon by the people who most need it . . . our first responders and our emergency managers? And indeed, your customers will have to know where the danger is and how to get out of that danger and how to report medically-difficult situations that they or their family members are in."

Coincidentally, at the time of the pre-hearing conference, Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) was notifying customers in parts of its Northern California service area of an impending power shut-off.

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CPUC Continues Existing 'Return on Equity' for Investor-Owned Utilities

During its final Voting Meeting of 2019, the CPUC unanimously approved continuing existing rates of shareholder returns on investment for four investor-owned utilities.

The decision was part of the CPUC's annual "Cost of Capital" proceeding that examines utilities' weighted average cost of debt, preferred equity, and common stock that a utility has issued to finance its investments.

As part of that proceeding, the CPUC attempts to set the authorized Return on Equity (ROE) at a level that is adequate to enable the utility to attract investors to finance the replacement and expansion of its facilities so it can fulfill its public utility service obligation.

Among other considerations, the ROE is determined by estimating market returns on investments for other companies with similar levels of risk known.

One issue of contention in the proceeding was which other companies, or proxies, the utilities proposed using as points of comparison for a fair ROE. Intervenors in the proceeding, such as The Utility Reform Network (TURN) and the Environmental Defense Fund each found fault with proxies included in the applications of Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) and San Diego Gas & Electric (SDG&E), for instance, that the in-

tervenors said undermined the utilities' financial modeling.

In their 2020 applications, PG&E, Southern California Edison, SDG&E, and Southern California Gas Company had all filed applications with the CPUC to increase their return on equity, or shareholder profits.

The electric companies had maintained that the higher returns were needed to keep attracting sufficient capital from investors, given the growing threat California has been facing from catastrophic wildfires.

Originally, before Governor Gavin Newsom's signed last legislative session's main wildfire-related bill, Assembly Bill 1054, the electric utilities had sought returns on equity of 16 percent for PG&E, 16.6 percent for SCE, and 14.3 percent for SDG&E based on "wildfire adders" each utility added to their base return on equity request resulting from their financial modeling.

After the law was enacted, the electric utilities reduced those return on equity requests to 12 percent for PG&E, 11.45 percent for SCE, and 12.8 percent for SDG&E, reflecting the passage of AB 1054. But the utilities continued to seek an increase to their returns due to wildfire risks, which the CPUC rejected. SoCalGas had requested a 10.7 percent return on equity both before and after the legislation was passed.

Calling the approved decision "a fair and just outcome," Commission President Marybel Batjer explained the significance of the issue before the CPUC.

"Capital is a critical part of operating a utility and providing safe and reliable service to ratepayers," she said. "As we seek to harden and modernize the grid, financial stability is vital to these efforts. The CPUC staff and Administrative

Tribal Land Policy Allows Easier Transfer Back to Original Owners

In June 2019, Governor Gavin Newsom issued an Executive Order and formally apologized to California's Native American Peoples for what he called our state's "dark history." For more than a century, the Governor said, that history was "fraught with violence, exploitation, dispossession, and the attempted destruction of tribal communities."

In creating a Truth and Healing Council to help clarify the historical record and "begin to heal deep wounds," Governor Newsom called on state agencies "to engage in government-to-government consultation with California Native American tribes regarding policies that may affect tribal communities."

I am proud to say that the CPUC heeded that call with the unanimous approval in December 2019 of a groundbreaking <u>Tribal Land</u> <u>Transfer Policy</u>.

This new policy follows up on our adoption in April 2018 of the <u>CPUC's Tribal Consultation Policy</u>, which was our way to give voice to the following CPUC goals:

- Recognition and respect for tribal sovereignty;
- Encouragement and facilitation of tribal participation in CPUC proceedings;
- Meaningful consideration to tribal interests in issues within the CPUC's jurisdiction; and,
- Protection of tribal cultural resources.

And now we have gone one big step farther.

California is home to more than 170 Native American tribes. California belongs to them. As I said when the Land Transfer Policy was approved at the CPUC's Voting Meeting in San Francisco on December 5, 2019, our agency headquarters on Van Ness Avenue in San Francisco sits on land that belongs to the Sitlintac tribe of the Ohlone people. The CPUC's offices at 300 Capitol Mall in Sacramento are in a building on land that belongs to the Plains Miwok people. And our Los Angeles office is on land of the Tongva people. By telling the truth about our past, we can begin to heal by taking actions that repair these injustices.

Our new Tribal Land Policy will require that all investor-owned utilities in our state that are considering divesting of surplus real property contact tribal governments, and under circumstances described in the policy, provide a right of first refusal to purchase the land.

Now, when the proposed transfer of land by a regulated investorowned utility comes before the CPUC for its approval as required by Section 851 of the California Public Utilities Code, the new policy establishes an expectation that a transfer of that property to an interested tribe is in the public interest.

Although the new land transfer policy was not yet in place, we saw the value of this practice last summer when Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) transferred approximately 2,325 acres of Plumas County land in the Humbug Valley east of Chico to a tribal consortium known as the Maidu Summit.

Once targeted for hydroelectric power, the land was no longer needed by PG&E, which had intended to sell the property to retire outstanding debt.

These Maidu ancestral lands in the Feather River watershed had been taken from the tribe in the late 1800s and early 1900s after

European settlers moved into California. Over the decades, timber, power, and livestock interests upended the meadows and flooded the valleys. Indian settlements and sacred sites were destroyed.

Local Maidu had made repeated requests to the Pacific Forest and Watershed Lands Stewardship Council, a private non-profit established as part of a settlement with the CPUC and PG&E related to its first bankruptcy, to get back the tribal land. With PG&E's cooperation and the hard work of many, some of these majestic homelands have been returned.

With our new policy, we'll have a formal process designed to make it easier and quicker to transfer such tribal lands back to their original owners. And we know there is more work to do. We will work with the tribes, regulated utilities, other stakeholders, and the public at-large to develop guidelines to fully implement this policy.

As Governor Newsom said when he issued his Executive Order, we can never fully repair or repay the injustice done to California's Native American Peoples. We can, however, do more than simply acknowledge these wrongs.

We can act towards building a new relationship with California's tribal communities. With the CPUC's new land transfer policy, we have a tremendous opportunity to do exactly that.

Get to Know Us: Meet CPUC Attorney Jack Mulligan

"Everything is important to someone" is a motto that CPUC Legal Counsel Jack Mulligan lives by. He credits his grandmother Jean Runyon, a Sacramento icon and pioneer into the once exclusively man's world of public relations, with setting a high bar for relationships and how to treat people.

That background informs Jack's goal of resolving problems and not just repeatedly treating symptoms, which comes in handy in Mulligan's currecnt job — providing counsel to CPUC staff, administrative law judges and commissioner offices about constraints on the Commission's decision-making in legal and regulatory frameworks.

He acknowledges that many issues can take decades to settle, often due to complicated relationships as much as complex technical issues.

While Jack once aspired to be a writer, his office is mostly decorated by photographs of athletes and original landscape paintings, many highlighting the beauty of the Sacramento Delta where he grew up waterskiing and enjoying the outdoors.

Nonetheless, the eye is drawn to one letter on his wall. The letter was written by President Harry Truman to Jack's maternal greatgrandfather, Brutus Hamilton — an Olympic athlete, Cal coach, National Track and Field Hall of Famer, writer, poet, angler, and Second World War U.S. Army Air Corps intelligence officer who grew up on the farm next to Truman in Peculiar, Missouri. The neatly framed letter provides yet another insight into Jack's family legacy of well-rounded achievement and service.

While Jack jokingly refers to his path to the CPUC as a "long trajectory of missteps and misadventures," it also reflects his own exploration for varied experiences and balance.

At 17, Jack backpacked for a few months from Amsterdam to Athens before heading to St. Mary's College for his degree from the Integral Program (Classics). From there he moved into a Christian Brothers' monastery in New York, serving as a member of LaSallian Volunteers/ Americorps where he managed a mentoring program and worked with wards of the court as a wilderness guide, ropes course facilitator, and intramural coordinator. His next adventure was Boalt Hall at UC Berkeley where he earned his law degree. After a couple years working on land use issues with a Sacramento law firm, Jack travelled through Thailand, Laos, and Vietnam before moving to San Francisco to follow his future wife.

That move was rewarded with another position as a land use attorney and living in the Mission District with his soon-to-be spouse. However, he too quickly found himself caught in the recession's layoffs.

Taking a step back to recalibrate, he followed the path of many CPUC employees and applied to be an intern in a CPUC Commissioner's office, in his case, the office of then-Commissioner Rachelle Chong. There, he launched a career that has provided variety, challenge, and work-life balance.

Jack especially enjoys his role on the eight-person advisory group in the CPUC's Legal Division, working with teams on issues such as the California Advanced Services Fund, which funds broadband services for underserved communities; Energy Procurement; Aliso Canyon Natural Gas Storage Facility; Mobile-home park conversions; Advice Letters; CPUC reform; and other duties.

"My areas of expertise include issues related to environmental, administrative and energy law, and legislation," he said.

Jack Mulligan's legal work for the CPUC covers multiple specialties.

While his day starts predictably with walking his children to school, he rarely knows what might come next. He checks emails before leaving the house for any urgent issues and then heads into the office to work on myriad projects.

After 12 years at the CPUC, Jack is most proud of the work-life balance he has crafted.

"Being involved and present in my children's life is a priority," he said. He also enjoys watching Sacramento "grow up," being part of the community, staying in touch with friends, and finding non-work adventures as well.

"The craziest thing I have ever done – that I can talk about," he said with a laugh, "is coaching kindergartners in basketball. You quickly realize that winning has nothing to do with the games. It's surviving practice."

He acknowledged that his work provided some of the skills that got him through that experience and that his personal life insights have contributed to his work. He credits his family legacy of solid core values, commitment to service, dealing with adversity head-on, and continued growth as a guide for whatever adventures his life may bring.

"Every day," he said, "is a rededication."

Energy Programs Expand Before Wildfire Season

As part of ongoing efforts to strengthen community wildfire resiliency throughout the state the California Public Utilities Commission has established new budgets and modified incentives of more than \$1 billion to fund the Self-Generation Incentive Program (SGIP) for the next critical fire season and subsequent years.

A January 2020 decision approves an SGIP annual budget of \$166 million for 2020-2024, for a total of \$830 million in new funding. Added to existing unspent funds from prior years, the decision allocates a total of \$1.2 billion in incentives and prioritizes funding of projects for communities most impacted by Public Safety Power Shut-off (PSPS) events.

The decision focuses the program on energy storage projects that serve customers with medical needs and impacted communities during PSPS events. The program targets Tier 2 and Tier 3 high fire threat districts, where there is "extreme" and "elevated" risk of fire, as well as medically vulnerable, disadvantaged and low income customers.

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Weather forecasts changed, however, and the final de-energization involved approximately 49,000 customers, far fewer than had been affected in October.

Paul Troxel of the Governor's Office of Emergency Services said one of the biggest challenges for emergency responders is getting accurate information about telecommunications failures as they occur so it can be shared with local agencies in a timely manner.

"The solution is clear," Troxel said, "The wireline, wireless and VOIP (Voice Over Internet Protocol) providers must be designated with sufficient backup power and reliable and redundant backhaul connectivity so that outages seen during the October 2019 event can be avoided in the future. Until a resilient, reliable communication network is in place, local agencies need to know when communication systems used by those in their community are potentially impacted by a disaster."

Information about telecommunications outages now comes in sporadically and inconsistently, he added, in part because some telecommunications providers regard it as confidential and proprietary.

Also, during planned power shut-offs, several telecommunications executives said they are deploying more permanent generators and other backup power sources.

But the executives also said the shut-offs have been particularly challenging because PG&E and other utilities often alter plans without much notice, depending on changing weather forecasts and actual conditions.

Jeff Luong, Vice President of Construction and Operations for AT&T focused on this challenge when he said, "My team deployed 60 generators here in the Bay Area all day yesterday in anticipation of this event occurring. And then the Bay Area wasn't part of the event anymore. And now we have to ship the generator into a different location... It's impossible to react to that type of situation."

But AT&T and other providers were chided because they have resisted mandatory regulations, saying they believed the best results could be achieved through non-mandatory innovation.

"I agree that we need to innovate," Batjer said. "I am deeply concerned that the communications companies have not adequately innovated and created best practices to meet the challenges of today."

Next steps in the process include a Scoping Memo from the Administrative Law Judge overseeing the proceeding and then a published schedule so stakeholders, the public, and other interested parties can participate.

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Law Judge recognized the importance of this proceeding and completed it in a timely manner."

As the decision noted, Assembly Bill 1054, among other provisions, established a new wildfire insurance fund that sought to manage the utilities' financial risk when electric equipment is determined responsible for igniting a wildfire.

"We find that the passage of AB 1054 and other investor supportive policies in California have mitigated wildfire exposure faced by California's utilities," the CPUC's Cost of Capital decision explains. "Accordingly, the Commission will not authorize a specific wildfire risk premium in the adopted return on equity."

The CPUC's vote means profit margins will remain at 10.25 percent for PG&E, 10.3 percent for Southern California Edison, 10.2 percent for SDG&E, and 10.5 percent for SoCalGas.

As the CPUC's decision explained, "AB 1054 was enacted, in part, because the financial effects of catastrophic wildfires had placed the state's electric industry in an 'unprecedented state of instability.' Among other things, in enacting AB 1054 the Legislature found that 'creation of a wildfire insurance fund will reduce the costs to ratepayers in addressing utilitycaused catastrophic wildfires' and further that the 'establishment of a wildfire fund supports the credit worthiness of the electrical corporations and provides a mechanism to attract capital for investment in safe, clean, and reliable power for California at a reasonable cost to ratepayers."
