#### PROPOSED OUTCOME:

Approves the Equity and Access (E&A) Grant Program and assigns responsibility and authority to use state-appropriated funds to provide technical assistance and capacity building for Federally recognized and non-Federally recognized California Native American Tribes (Tribes) and Community-Based Organizations (CBOs) through the E&A Grant Program. Establishes a mechanism pursuant to the Budget Act of 2022 (Assembly Bill 179 (Stats. 2022, Ch. 249)), which allocated \$30 million in funding to supply capacity grants to CBOs that conduct outreach and obtain technical assistance in California Public Utilities Commission decision making processes and supporting activities and that support ongoing equity initiatives and provide clean energy access opportunities to Tribes and CBOs.

## **Background**

- In 2022, the California Legislature appropriated \$30 million in the <u>Budget Act of 2022</u> (AB 179) for capacity grants to Tribes and community-based organizations (CBOs) for participation in the CPUC decision-making process and to make certain clean energy programs are accessible to underserved and underrepresented communities.
- The Equity and Access (E&A) Grant Program was created to implement this legislation.

# Public Participation Grant Account

## **Public Participation Grant Account**

- Total Proposed Funding: \$3,100,000
- Tribal Reserve\*: \$300,000
- Funding Cap Per Organization: \$15,000
- Application and Funding Cycle: Rolling, beginning summer 2023

\*Tribal applicants are eligible for both Tribal-reserved and general non-reserved funds.

#### **Public Participation Grant Account**

- Awards grants up to \$15,000 for an eligible entity to participate in defined and discrete activities. e.g. speaking on a workshop panel, service on working group or participation in other decision-making processes.
- Grant account cap per organization of \$15,000 will ensure a proportional distribution of funds over time and across various organizations.
- Prompt grant payments will be dispersed after completion of project activities identified in approved application.
- Organizations that have previously applied to or received Intervenor Compensation are eligible to apply, as long as the Intervenor Compensation award was not denied due to lack of financial hardship.

## Equity, Engagement, and Education Grant Account

- Total Proposed Funding: \$9,750,000
- **Tribal Reserve\*:** \$750,000
- Per Application Maximum Award: \$200,000
- Application and Funding Cycle:
  - o 1st cycle applications available September 8, 2023
  - 2nd cycle applications available spring 2024

\*Tribal applicants are eligible for both Tribal-reserved and general non-reserved funds.

### **Equity, Engagement and Education Account**

- Awards grants up to \$200,000 for the purposes of building CBO, Tribal, and community capacity to understand and engage with CPUC decision-making processes.
- Activities in this category may include:
  - o Community engagement and outreach related to CPUC proceedings.
  - o Hiring consultants and staff for activities necessary for active participation in decision-making processes at the CPUC.
  - Education, training, and curriculum development regarding CPUC processes, proceedings, and programs.
  - o Partnership and coalition development to bring greater awareness of CPUC matters to disadvantaged communities.

# Clean Energy Access Grant Account

## Clean Energy Access Grant Account

- Total Proposed Funding: \$13,700,000
- Tribal Reserve\*: \$1,950,000
- Per Application Maximum Award: \$500,000
- Application and Funding Cycle:
  - o 1st cycle applications available late 2023 or early 2024
  - o 2nd cycle applications available Summer 2024

\*Tribal applicants are eligible for both Tribal-reserved and general non-reserved funds.

### **Clean Energy Access Grant Account**

- Awards grants up to \$500,000 to develop clean energy access opportunities that complement the Microgrid Incentive Program (MIP), Self-Generation Incentive Program (SGIP) and Technology and Equipment for Clean Heating Initiative (TECH).
- Examples of potential projects include:
  - Conducting community outreach to gather necessary information for a microgrid project through the MIP.
  - o Hiring technical assistance to support procuring a developer for a clean energy project through MIP or to support the uptake of SGIP incentives in targeted communities.
  - Developing pathways to use TECH program to achieve building decarbonization in disadvantaged communities.
- This grant account will not fund infrastructure buildouts, such as hardware or equipment, but will help facilitate the planning of projects.
- Clean Energy Access Grant Account eligible projects must be in an area served by an investor-owned utility.

### Clean Energy Grant Account Technical Support

- A clean energy subject matter expert (SME) will be available to Tribes and CBOs for application support and questions about CPUC's clean energy programs.
- The SME will provide technical assistance based on the needs of the Tribe's or CBO's community.

#### **Eligible Applicants**

- TYPE 1: California tax-exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.
- TYPE 2: Federally and non-Federally recognized Tribes, as defined in Public Resources Code (PRC) Section 21073. PRC Section 21073 defines a California Native American Tribe as a Native American Tribe located in California that is on the contact list maintained by the Native American Heritage Commission for the purposes of Chapter 905 of the Statutes of 2004.
- **TYPE 3:** Tribal entities, including organizations incorporated under Tribal law and wholly owned by the Tribe, Tribal Section 17 Corporations, and Tribal utilities and authorities operated under Tribal law.
