- · Closes the proceeding.

Item #9 [23518] – Public Housing Infrastructure Projects for Grant Funding from the California Advanced Services Fund

Res T-17886

PROPOSED OUTCOME:

- Approves up to \$224,050 in funding from the California Advanced Services Fund (CASF) Broadband Public Housing Account (BPHA) for four infrastructure projects.
- Deploys wireless point to multi-point connection and wireless broadband infrastructure capable of 100 Megabits per second (Mbps) download and 20 Mbps upload for 95 living units in these four publicly supported housing developments.
- · Allows for free broadband service to those that lack such service.

SAFETY CONSIDERATIONS:

• Access to broadband service will improve public safety and enable access to government, e-health, and online education opportunities.

ESTIMATED COST:

• \$224,050 from the CASF BPHA. CASF's accounts are funded through a surcharge whereby revenues are deposited to CASF Fund 3141 with the State's Treasury.

Item #57 [23584] - California Advanced Services Fund Adoption Account

Res T-17885

PROPOSED OUTCOME:

 Approves up to \$1,180,540 in funding from the California Advanced Services Fund (CASF) Broadband Adoption Account for 10 digital literacy projects. Collectively, these projects will provide digital literacy training to 1,831 participants.

SAFETY CONSIDERATIONS:

• There are no safety considerations associated with this resolution.

ESTIMATED COST:

• \$1,180,540 from the Adoption Account. CASF's accounts are funded through a surcharge whereby revenues are deposited to CASF Fund 3141 with the State's Treasury. The surcharge mechanism is a flat rate for each active access line that telephone corporations service in California levied at the surcharge rate of \$0.90. The flat surcharge is divided among the six Universal Service Programs of which CASF receives a 28.50% share. Pursuant to Public Utilities Code section 270, subd.(b), money in the funds may only be expended upon appropriation in the Annual Budget Act or upon supplemental appropriation. For fiscal year 2024/2025, the Commission issued Resolution T-17825 which set an appropriation amount of \$36.385 million for the Adoption Account. These appropriations were adopted in the California Budget Act for the respective fiscal year.

2024 DACAG Equity Framework



- 1. Guide and focus the DACAG as it engages in discussing and commenting on proceedings and programs before the CPUC and CEC
- 2. Guide agency staff and Commissioners as they determine how to embed and center equity within their efforts
- 3. Prioritize funding and resources for the individuals and communities in California most impacted by climate change, recognizing that they have been underinvested
- 4. Guide proceedings and decision-making process, particularly those lacking the engagement of individuals and communities most impacted
- 5. Guide agency staff and Commissioners on DACAG's general position on specific equity-related considerations

7. Workforce Development

Workforce development refers both to the training and preparation of workers (supply-side), and to the career opportunities available to those workers (demand-side). Climate policies and programs can invest in both by:

- Promoting and funding workforce training pathways and wraparound services, including pre-apprenticeship, apprenticeship, and other industry-recognized training programs, to high-quality careers in the construction, climate infrastructure, and clean energy industries
- Providing opportunities to train the next generation of climate leaders and workers for the clean energy economy
- Setting and tracking hiring goals (local, regional, and targeted hire) across career lever for low-income and underrepresented populations who've been locked out of prosper to increase access to and representation in the climate workforce
- Including labor standards, such as prevailing wage and industry-appropriate standard beyond wages (benefits, etc.), in publicly-funded programs and contracts
- Prioritizing careers that offer economic mobility and advancement pathways, not just one-off jobs
- Recognizing that utilizing a high-quality, well-compensated workforce ensures quality work, which advances CA's climate goals.
- Prioritize workforce programs that are accessible to underserved communities, emphasizing the need for programs with reduced time commitments and offer services tailored to trainees with limited English proficiency.
- Advocate for workforce programs that specifically support re-entry populations (justice-impacted/formerly incarcerated individuals).

The CA Workforce Development Board (CWDB) offers a strong framework for creating and sustaining quality jobs and careers, referred to as the High Road. Both the CPUC and CEC hold Memoranda of Understanding (MOU) with the CWDB to align their shared climate goals with workforce development and economic justice:

Finally, the University of California Berkeley Labor Center's report, <u>A Jobs and Climate Action Plan for 2030</u>, lays out the connection between climate and careers, and how to advance job quality through climate action.


