

Decentralization of the California Public Utilities Commission



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Background

- Headquartered in San Francisco since 1878.
- Late 1980's the construction of a larger location, 505 Van Ness San Francisco, began to address the growing needs of the CPUC. The CPUC occupied the Van Ness location by 1990.
- CPUC offices were located throughout California between 1950 and 1990 in: Bakersfield; El Centro; Eureka; Fresno; Oakland; Redding; Sacramento; San Bernardino; San Jose; San Diego, Santa Ana; Santa Barbara; Santa Rosa; Stockton and San Francisco.
- Today the percentage of positions located in San Francisco is (76%), Sacramento (13%), and Los Angeles (11%).





Administrative Directive

- In 2016 a CPUC reform package titled "Principles for Reform:
 Governance, Accountability, Transparency and Oversight of the
 California Public Utilities Commission" was released by the Governor's
 Office and sponsored by Assemblyman Mike Gatto and Senators
 Jerry Hill and Mark Leno.
- The first principle of the package reads in part:

Governance

- Increasing the CPUC focus and expertise by relocating responsibilities and making logistical changes to improve the commission's ability to function
- 2. Establish cross agency cooperation to foster coordinated actions and exchange of information and facilitate cultural exchange
- Authorize the CPUC to hire and locate employees in San Francisco, Los Angeles and Sacramento



Why Decentralize?

- CPUC staff closer to constituents they serve allowing more public participation in hearings, workshops and other meetings
- CPUC staff closer to Governor's Office, Legislature, Control agencies, and sister agencies making it easier when implementing state laws, policies, and fostering cross agency relationships
- Larger candidate pools in filling vacancies
- Provides more opportunities for training, career development and networking for staff

Phase One of Decentralization

- Surveyed Director's asking for plans on decentralization
- Number of positions (new positions, staff requests and through attrition) to be located in Sacramento and Los Angeles based on business needs are:
 - Sacramento 180
 - Executive Division 5
 - Administrative Division 69
 - Human Resources 20
 - Information Technology Services Division 58
 - Communications Division 1
 - Water Division 8
 - Office of Safety Advocates 1
 - Energy Division 18
 - Los Angeles 50
 - Administrative Division 1
 - Human Resources 1
 - Information Technology Services Division 1
 - Energy Division 45
 - Office of Safety Advocates 2





Phase One of Decentralization

- Working with Control Agencies
 - DOF BCP (for increased budget authority for additional space)
 - DGS additional space to lease in Sacramento and LA

- Providing updates to staff through:
 - All Hands Meetings
 - Staff Meetings





Phase Two of Decentralization FY 2020-21

- Concentrated effort to decentralize the ALJ Division to allow the constituents CPUC serves to have increased accessibility to participate in hearings, workshops and other meetings
- In order for the ALJ Division to decentralize CPUC will need to obtain space that has:
 - Large and small hearing rooms
 - Large and small conference rooms
 - Several private offices
 - Space for court reporters
 - Storage Space





Phase Two of Decentralization FY 2020-21

- Legal Division to decentralize by location to support divisions and industry they represent
- Programs will continue to evaluate needs
- Lease space in San Diego for Program/Technical positions
